Instruction for Authors

Xjenza is the journal of the Malta Chamber of Scientists and is published by the Chamber in hard copy and in electronic format on the website http://www.xjenza.com. This website is hosted by the Faculty of Science of the University of Malta.

Xjenza will consider for publication manuscripts in the following categories:

- (01) Communications
- (02) Reviews
- (03) Research Articles
- (04) Notes
- (05) Brief Research Reports
- (06) Research Reports
- (07) Comments and Responses
- (08) Errata
- (09) News
- (10) Commentaries

Communications are short peer-reviewed research articles (limited two three journal pages) describing new important results meriting urgent publication. These are normally followed by a full Research Article.

Research Articles form the main category of scientific papers submitted to *Xjenza*. The same standards of scientific content and quality that apply to Communications apply to regular Research Articles.

Reviews: *Xjenza* also publishes peer-reviewed 'Review Articles' describing work which is of interest to the wide readership characteristic of *Xjenza*. Review Articles should be written in a way that the length is kept to the minimum consistent with comprehensibility (normally exceed 15 journal pages). Authors are strongly advised to contact one of the Editors before writing a Review

Notes are fully referenced peer-reviewed short articles limited to four journal pages describing new theories, concepts and developments made by the authors in any branch of science and technology. Notes need not contain results from experimental or simulation work.

Brief Research Reports are intended as a medium for reporting work carried out in Malta or by Maltese researchers that has been presented at scientific meetings or conferences or has been published in leading international journals. Brief Research Reports are limited to three journal pages and must include a footnote to the Title stating where the work was originally reported. It is the authors' responsibility to ensure that no copyright agreements are being breached.

Research Reports are extended reports describing research work that is being carried out in Malta or by Maltese researchers written in such a way that it will be of interest to a wide scientific audience characteristic of *Xjenza*. Please contact one of the editors to discuss the suitability of topics for Research Reports.

Comments and Responses: *Xjenza* publishes Comments. The purpose of a Comment is to correct significant errors in articles published in *Xjenza*, to take issue with the conclusions reached, or to provide additional insight or corroboration. Comments must be concise, substantive, and free of polemics. They must address scientific issues only. Comments on questions of priority or calling attention to a minor oversight in a reference list do not benefit our readers enough to be published and can be settled by the author of the original manuscript by writing an Addendum. If the author of the Comment is wrong, or if he/she has simply misunderstood the original, it will be best to settle the matter privately. The Comment is limited to no more than three printed pages. The title should read: Comment on "Original title" by ***, *Xjenza*, vol. *** (year). The author is given an opportunity to reply. The Response should take up no more than one printed page. The title should read: Response to "Comment on 'Original title" by ***, *Xjenza*, vol. *** (year). The Comment and Response will then be reviewed. If the Comment is rejected, neither will be published. If the Response alone is rejected, the Comment will be published without the Response. No further exchange beyond this point can be considered for publication. At their discretion, the editors may also publish the Comment and Response without peer review, in which case a footnote will be added stating that "The 'Comment' and its 'Response' are published 'as received' from the respective authors and have not been peer-reviewed."

Errata: Xjenza also publishes errata, in which authors correct significant errors of substance in their published manuscripts. The title should read: Erratum: "Original title" by ***, *Xjenza*, vol. *** (year). Errata should be as short as consistent with clarity.

News: The News section provides a space for articles up to three pages in length describing leading developments in any field of science and technology or for reporting items such as conference reports. As space in *Xjenza* is limited, you are advised to contact one of the editors prior to submission of such an article. The Editors reserve the right to modify or reject articles for consideration as 'news items'.

Commentaries provide a space for manuscripts up to three pages in length for material falling outside the usual categories. Please contact one of the editors to discuss the suitability of topics for Commentaries.

In addition to this, Xjenza regularly publishes Invited Articles, that is articles written on invitation by the Editors.

Submission of Manuscripts

Manuscripts prepared using the pre-formatted Xjenza template should be sent in electronic format (ideally through e-mail) to one of the Editors of *Xjenza*:

If it not possible to prepare the manuscript using the pre-formatted template, authors may submit their Manuscript as a hard copy or as 'Rich Text Format' (RTF) as discussed in the section 'Preparation of Manuscripts' below.

Referees

All manuscripts submitted to Xjenza are peer reviewed. Authors are requested to submit together with the manuscript, the names and addresses of two referees, preferably from overseas but the editors reserve the right to choose their own reviewers.

Conflict of Interest

Authors are expected to disclose any commercial or other associations that might pose a conflict of interest in connection with the submitted article. All funding sources supporting the work, and institutional or corporate affiliations of the authors, should be acknowledged on the title page or at the end of the article.

Articles are considered for publication on the understanding that neither the article nor its essential substance has been or will be published elsewhere before appearing in Xjenza. The only exception to this rule is work submitted as a 'Brief Research Report' where research work carried out in Malta or by Maltese researchers that has been presented at scientific meetings or conferences or has been published in leading international journals can be presented with a footnote to the Title stating where the work was originally reported. It is the authors' responsibility to ensure that no copyright agreements are being breached.

Permissions

It is the responsibility of the author of the manuscripts to ensure that there is no infringement of copyright when submitting material to Xjenza. In particular, when material is copied from other sources, the authors must obtain a written statement from both author and publisher giving permission for reproduction. Authors are also expected to obtain permission in writing from at least one author of manuscripts still in press, of unpublished data, and of personal communications.

Preparation of Manuscripts

Manuscripts submitted to Xjenza should ideally be prepared using the pre-formatted Xjenza template which is available online on the *Xjenza* website. When preparing the manuscripts, authors are requested to preface each paper with:

- A suitable title (which should normally not exceed 150 characters)
- The author(s) name(s), and the full address of the institution in which the work was carried out (please identify the author for proofs - giving e-mail address, telephone and fax numbers - for correspondence and reprint requests)
- An abstract of no more than 200 words, and up to 8 keywords. [This does not apply to Brief Research Reports, Comments and Responses, Errata and News].

Research reports should have an appropriate introduction, a single methods section (with the methodology of all experiments reports), results, and discussion. Either British or American spelling are acceptable, but authors are requested to be consistent. Authors should normally express measurements in SI units, although they may include older conventional units in parentheses if they wish. Except for units of measurement, abbreviations should be spelled out on first use, and should be standard. Drug names should be generic, although authors may add brand names in parentheses if they wish. Illustrations should be embedded within the manuscript in 'single-column' format (preferably). If any figures are to appear as 'double-column' format, this should be inserted at the end of the document. Alternatively, images may be submitted separately in electronic format in a common format (Bitmap, JPG or TIFF). Authors are requested to ensure that illustrations are of publishing quality. Tables should bear Roman numerals and embedded in 'single-column' format (preferably). If any table is to appear as 'double-column' format within the manuscript, this should be inserted at the end of the document. Each table requires a title, but no legend. Alternatively, tables may be prepared in a separate document were each table is typed on a separate sheet. Footnotes should be identified by superscripts 1, 2, 3, etc. Supplementary information in electronic format (e.g. X-Ray data, animations, movies, etc.) may also be submitted for publication on the *Xjenza* website at the discretion of the Editors.

References: References should follow the Harvard system. In the text give the author(s) name and, in parentheses, the date of the paper/book being cited. Differentiate between work by the same author in the same year by a, b, c etc., immediately after the date. Where there are three or more authors use et al. in the text and a, b, c to resolve ambiguities. All citations must be listed at the end of the manuscript, ordered alphabetically by first author's name. For each first author, list single author works, next joint authored works in alphabetical order, last multi-authored works in chronological order. Each reference should give the names and initials of each author (unless the number of co-authors exceeds fifteen), the year of publication, the title of the article, the name of the journal or book in full (in italics), the volume or edition (in bold), the first and last page, and, for books, the publisher and town of publication. For example:

We also accept manuscripts where in the text, irrespective of the number of authors, a 'paper' is referred to only by the surname of the first author followed by publication year, using a, b, c to resolve ambiguities. In such cases, when listing the cited work at the end of the manuscript, the list should be ordered alphabetically by first author's name in chronological order. If the same name appears more than once in some particular year, then the list should be ordered according to the labels 'a, b, c, etc.' used in the text. Also, in the case of journals, the standard abbreviated form of the journal name may be used instead of the journal's full name in the references list, e.g. *J. Am. Chem. Soc.* may be used instead of *Journal of the American Chemical Society*.

Proofs, Reprints and Copyright

Authors will normally be sent page proofs by e-mail or fax where available. A list of any necessary corrections should sent by fax or e-mail to corresponding editor within three days of proof receipt so as to avoid unnecessary delays in the publication of the article. Alterations, other than essential corrections to the text of the article, should not be made at this stage; the cost of such alterations may be passed on to the author.

Manuscripts are accepted for publication on the understanding that exclusive copyright is assigned to *Xjenza*. However, this does not limit the freedom of the author(s) to use material in the articles in any other published works.

ETHICAL POLICY

Studies using human subjects should include a statement within the manuscript that subjects provided informed consent for their participation and that the study was approved by a local ethics committee.

Studies using animal subjects must conform to internationally accepted standards of animal welfare, and authors should include an appropriate statement to that effect, either within the manuscript or in their covering letter. Every effort should be made to minimize the number of animals used.

The editors will welcome the submission of work in any area of science. However, studies that subject animals to pain or stress require special consideration and three principles will be used to judge the ethics of such work. First, experiments of this kind will be required to reach a higher threshold of scientific quality in order to be publishable. Second, the utility of the study will be assessed, in terms of the balance between the distress inflicted and the likelihood of benefit. Third, it must be demonstrated that the objectives of the experiment could not have been achieved by the use of less stressful procedures; the fact that a particular procedure has been used in previously published work will not in itself suffice. The editors believe that scientists apply strict ethical criteria to their work, and will have no difficulty in meeting these requirements.

NOTE: If it is not possible to prepare the manuscript using the pre-formatted template, authors are requested to submit their manuscript in hard copy. When submitting a manuscript as a 'hardcopy', please submit 4 copies, typewritten, double spaced with wide margins. After an article has been accepted for publication, authors will be requested to provide, if possible, the final version in machine readable form. In such cases, authors are requested to submit illustrations in electronic format in a common format (Bitmap, JPG or TIFF). In exceptional circumstances, illustrations may also be provided as 'hard copies' In such cases, all illustrations should be lightly numbered on the back in pencil, with orientation and your name. We prefer glossy photographs or professionally prepared line drawings; any lettering and symbols must be large enough to stand reduction in size - publication could be delayed if lettering or symbols are too small. For halftones send unmounted glossy photographs with explanatory legends on a separate sheet of paper. Please send one set of photographs and attach a set of photocopies to each copy of the manuscript.
